Welcome and Introductions	The July 2025 monthly meeting of the Consortium for a Healthier Miami-Dade Healthy Baby Taskforce was brought to order by Tenesha Avent at 12:37 p.m. All members were welcomed and introduced themselves.

Future Taskforce Presentation	 During the May Taskforce meeting Viviana Alvarado and Marya Meyer with The Women's Fund Miami-Dade presented on the Alliance for Infant and Maternal Health (AIM) dashboard. A reminder was shared with the Taskforce due to low attendance back from our inperson meeting in May, the AIM presentation has been rescheduled for Friday, August 15, 2025, and will be presented by Val Butler, Project and Grants Manager, Alliance for Infant and Maternal Health Miami-Dade of The Women's Fund Miami-Dade. BreastfeedMIAMI Community Report An update was shared Dr. Lebron has been invited to present the findings of BreastfeedMiami community Report; confirmation is pending, and updates will be provided once finalized. There were no further suggestions for future presentations. 	



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New Business

Community Concerns Conversation

Tenesha Avent led and continued the discussion with the Taskforce members from the June meeting to share current updates on the funding landscape. These updates are being shared to raise awareness of current funding updates on surrounding programs part of organizations you may be working with on related to other key community initiatives. Previously recommended by Taskforce partners was to host a future townhall or panel discussion. The partners discussed and shared their current experiences as well as potential opportunities to see how to link community residents to needed services during this time. Key discussion points are noted below.

- ICU Baby shared they are starting to see the effects of some of these changes to the populations they serve and continue to stay up to date on additional updates.
- Another key point the Taskforce partners discussed was the closing of four maternity wards in our community which include Hialeah, North Shore, Jackson West, and Palmetto General. It was noted possibly Jackson South maternity department would be closing later this year. Val Butler was going to further research and learn more to share with the partners. The Healthy Baby Taskforce would like to further understand and get to the root causes (e.g., lack of patients, insufficient/timeliness of Medicaid reimbursements) of these closures.
- Tenesha Avent shared the following updates on behalf of March of Dimes.
 - 1. Federal Medicaid Cuts
 - a. A recently signed federal tax and spending bill includes major Medicaid reductions anticipated to **cut roughly \$4 billion annually** from Florida's Medicaid funding.
 - b. About **4.3 million Floridians**—nearly 19% of the state's population—rely on Medicaid, including a large portion of pregnant women and infants.
 - c. "Extreme blow" that could force hospital service reductions, increase travel distances for care, and drive up healthcare costs for low-income families.
 - d. Medicaid pays for **42% of births in Florida**, these cuts threaten prenatal and postpartum care access for pregnant people.
 - e. Miami-Dade County alone has over 18,000 pregnant/postpartum women on Medicaid.
 - f. New eligibility work requirements, reduced retroactive coverage, and provider payment restrictions—further jeopardizing access to care.
 - 2. State-Level Health Program Reductions
 - a. Florida's FY 2025–26 budget includes **\$260.8 million in cuts** to the Community Public Health Program, which supports health promotion and maternal services.
 - b. The FY 2025–26 budget wiped out nearly **\$188 million** from children's services, reducing access to prenatal care and screenings.



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	 c. Healthcare Innovation Council's funding—designed for low-interest loans to strengthen maternal health infrastructure—is being repealed. This undermines workforce capacity, clinic innovation, and maternal-child coordination. d. Florida hospitals rely on Medicaid payments, but cuts force closure of labor & delivery units—especially in rural areas 	
New Business CHIP Annual Meeting Recap	Tenesha Avent reported a high-level recap of the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) Annual Meeting to the Healthy Baby Taskforce partners. This meeting was hosted at FIU North Wolfe University Center on Monday, June 23, 2025. There was a total of 116 attendees. During this meeting, the Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships (MAPP) assessment results were shared, and community members had the opportunity to vote and discuss the issues impacting health and wellness in Miami-Dade County. During this meeting, a total of five priority areas were selected. The new 2025-2030 CHIP Priority Areas will include Access to Care, Chronic Disease, Behavioral & Mental Health, Maternal Child Health, and Healthy Weight/Physical Activity/Nutrition. The new priority areas will assist with the development of the new 2025-2030 Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). Partners shared their experience from the meeting and how the results from the CHIP meeting will inform work plan.	
	In alignment with the CHIP, updates were shared on the new Florida Healthy Baby FY 25-26 priority areas. These priority areas will include Well Woman Care, Maternal Mortality and Morbidity, Infant Mortality, Dental or Oral Care, and Children's Medical Homes.	
Partner Updates	 BreastfeedMIAMI: Leah Jayanetti shared August is National Breastfeeding Month. The upcoming 14th Annual Breastfeeding Awareness Family Day will be held August 23, 2025 at the Doral Legacy Park Community Center from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. There will be a lot of exciting activities, giveaways and workshops. Families can sign-up and RSVP here. Consortium for a Healthier Miami-Dade: A reminder was shared on the available Consortium resources. This is extremely important to ensure that the population they are serving is supported and excited about what can be really challenging in the NICU, which is breastfeeding.
