e. CPPW NEMS findings and Food Policy Council	<ul> <li>LB presented on the major findings of the NEMS (Nutritional Environment Measurement Survey) conducted as part of the CPPW grant</li> <li>SFRPC was contracted by the MDCDH to conduct a NEMS in certain areas of Miami-Dade</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>The purpose of the assessment was to determine the availability of healthy food, interest in having a larger selection of fruits and vegetables and impediment to stocking healthy food</li> <li>NEMS measures the availability, price and quality of produce in stores. SFRPC modified the NEMS to include WIC and SNAP approved foods.</li> <li>A vendor survey was conducted alongside the NEMS</li> </ul>	



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	<ul><li>Methods</li></ul>	
	<ul> <li>44 Convenience stores were targeted in zip-codes which had areas of greatest need, mostly in North Miami</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>The area was expanded to include Southern areas due to concerns with safety or store owner's unwillingness to participate</li> </ul>	
	<ul><li>Findings</li></ul>	
	<ul> <li>Food distributors play a major role in deciding what inventory stores carry because they have brand preferences. Multiple stores may use the same distributor therefore limiting brand competition and food availability.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Most common available fruit was bananas (50% of stores)</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>The most available vegetable was tomatoes (42%)</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>2% Milk was present in 43% of stores; skim milk was present in 11% of stores</li> </ul>	
	<ul><li>Recommendations</li></ul>	
	<ul> <li>Develop a healthy corner stores network so that corner store owners can decide what food to stock instead of letting the distributor decide.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Leverage collaborative approaches to health. For example, engage physicians and health care providers to coordinate with convenience stores to provide screening/referrals</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Partner with Miami-Dade County Schools</li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>The food policy council is comprised of volunteers from</li> </ul>
