Presentation 1:	EIC member, Solina Rulfs, Food Systems Specialist, and Jeannie Necessary,
UF IFAS	Public Health Specialist gave a very interesting presentation on the University of
Extension Family	Florida IFAS Extension Family Nutrition Program (FNP), as well as, the
Nutrition Program	Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and Education. Important
	statistics presented included:
	• Florida has the 3 <sup>rd</sup> highest SNAP participation nationwide (after CA & TX);
	• Approximately 1 of every 5 Floridians qualify for SNAP;
	• Approximately half of SNAP-receiving households in Miami-Dade County
	include at least one senior over 60.
	SNAP-Education is the nutrition promotion and obesity prevention component of
	SNAP; the goal is to improve the likelihood that persons eligible for SNAP will
	make healthy food and lifestyle choices that prevent obesity. The UF/IFAS
	Extension FNP provides nutrition education in 40 counties in Florida. All the
	classes taught and the community changes supported are evidence-based and come
	from the Dietary Guidelines for Americans; ChooseMyPlate.gov resources are
	used. Jeannie Necessary explained that SNAP-Ed includes Policy, Systems, and
	Environmental (PSE) activities to support direct nutrition education; she also
	reviewed the role of the Food System Team and Specialists as a public health team.
	Also reviewed were the following two Famers Market Incentive Programs:
	SNAP/Fresh Access Bucks
	Seniors Farmers Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP)

New Medicare	Survey and Certifications Operations (CQISCO) presented on Centers for	
Card	Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) new Medicare card. Background info:	
	• The Health Insurance Claim Number (HICN) is a Medicare beneficiary's	
	identification number, used for processing claims and determining	
	eligibility for services across multiple entities (e.g., Social Security	
	Administration (SSA), Railroad Retirement Board (RRB), States, Medicare	
	providers & health plans).	
	The Medicare Access and CHIP Reauthorization Act (MACRA) of 2015	
	requires removal of the Social Security Number (SSN)-based HICN from	
	Medicare cards to address current risk of beneficiary medical identity theft	
	<ul> <li>MACRA requires that CMS mail out new Medicare cards with a new</li> </ul>	
	Medicare Number by April 2019.	
	• The new Medicare numbers won't change Medicare benefits. People with	
	Medicare can start using their new Medicare cards right away.	
	Medicare started mailing out the new Medicare cards to beneficiaries in April 2018	
	and this will continue nationally over a period of approximately 12 months. The	
	new cards have a unique Medicare number (replacing the Social Security number);	
	the new number is 11 digits and alpha-numeric. People with Medicare can go to	
	www.Medicare.gov/newcard to sign up for emails about the care mailing and to	
	check the card mailing status in their state. Once your card has been mailed, you	
	can look up your Medicare Number or print a card on MyMedicare.gov. People	
	should use the new card once they get it, but either the SSN-based or the new	
	random alphanumeric-based numbers can be used through December 2019;	
	beginning January 1, 2020 only the new card will be usable. The new Medicare	
	card mailing in Florida will begin after June 2018. Beware of scam artists	
	contacting you about your new card. Once you receive your new Medicare card,

Outreach and educational materials for people with Medicare were reviewed and include the following:</li> <li>One-Page Flyer- a stand-alone reprint handout of <i>Medicare &amp; You</i> inside cover page; available in English, Spanish, Korean, Chinese, Japanese, or Vietnamese.</li> <li>Fact Sheet- with info addressing common things to know about the new card.</li> <li>Widgets- with link to www.go.medicare.gov/newcard.</li> <li>Informational Video- an animated video about the new card and what to expect.</li> <li>Find more technical information, detailed updates, training opportunities, and materials to share on the web: www.CMS.gov/newcard.</li> <li>(The presentation was later emailed to EIC members on 8/9/18.)</li> <li>Mayor Giménez came by for a few minutes and made the following comments: "Starting this fall, Medicare is mailing new, more secure Medicare cards to the 453,795 Medicare beneficiaries who reside in Miami-Dade County. The new cards will have a new Medicare number that is unique to each person. They will no longer have Social Security numbers on them. Medicare is getting rid of the old cards because scammers sometimes use Social Security numbers in an attempt to steal people's identities, open new credit card accounts or even take out loans in</li> </ul>	
	other people's names. To assist Medicare beneficiaries through this transition, we are partnering with the centers for Medicare and Medicaid services (CMS) to raise awareness about the new Medicare card rollout and potential fraud schemes surrounding the new cards." The Mayor also thanked everyone for all their efforts and work with seniors in Miami-Dade County.
