	• The intergenerational walk event originally planned for Saturday, January 13 <sup>th</sup> ,	
	2024, had to be postponed in mid-December due to scheduling conflicts with	
	Miami-Dade Parks, Recreation and Open Spaces (MDPROS) at their Deerwood	
	Bonita Lakes Park location. The walk event is meant to encourage physical activity	
	for older adults in collaboration with the Consortium's Children Issues Committee	
	(CIC) so that children and their families can participate as well. Prior to today's	
	meeting, in mid-January, MDPROS contact and EIC member, Allan Tavss, Active	
	Older Adults Program Coordinator suggested an alternate park site, Arcola Lakes	
	Park, located at 1301 NW 83 Street, Miami, FL 33147 in Liberty City area, and the	
	new planned date is Saturday, April 6 <sup>th</sup> , 2024, from 10AM-12PM. MDPROS will	
	be the host for walk event which will feature a health and wellness fair. There will	
	be 8-10 tables inside the park office for participating community partner	
	organizations to provide health resources and program service information to	





	attendees. This alternate park was selected because it is also near some of the 16 zip codes in the north found to have a combination of the highest percentages of underserved, of individuals ages 65 years or older, who are not physically active.  The other health indicators considered to help identify the zip codes of interest included physical inactivity, obesity, living less than a 10-minute walk from a park, and living under the poverty level. Additionally, the Arcola Lakes Park is close to Arcola Lakes Senior Center which is one of MDPROS sites that offers Active Older Adults programs which provide fitness, leisure, and social activities for adults 55 and older.  • Shared onscreen, the draft of the event flyer, "Walk for Your Health in 2024" which is pending final approval from DOH. It features the participating partner organization logos that were previously provided. The walk and health fair flyer will be used to promote the event as part of the campaign to increase awareness of physical activity, the health benefits of regular physical activity, and promote the County's parks and programs. Member, Doug Bermudez, said he would help promote the event by posting the flyer locally at the Miami-Dade Transit Golden Passport Office.
Executive Board (EB) Update	<ul> <li>Vice-Chair, Susan H. provided the updates from EB 1/8/24 meeting, including:</li> <li>The Executive Board met virtually on Monday, January 8<sup>th</sup>, 2024. The Board has created its schedule for 2024 and will host virtual monthly meetings and meet inperson quarterly with a hybrid option available.</li> <li>A friendly reminder, the Worksite Wellness committee still has a Chair vacancy. This is a great leadership opportunity for those who are interested in being a part of the Consortiums leadership.</li> <li>The Board continues the conversation on COVID-19, health equity, and addressing the root causes of health. It was noted that COVID cases have started to increase again. Updates were shared on the CDC COVID-19 and Health Equity grant that currently the focus is the evaluation and sustainability components of each of the projects. Some of the initiatives like the food pantries completed in December but should be able to continue and sustain themselves as the processes have been implemented.</li> </ul>

- Other existing task forces and work groups to represent older adults' needs, and/or those of us that are members are not reporting back on other groups and/or our own organizations
- Crisis response and internal communication to members/providers in emergencies
- Need to increase participation of members with expertise to share their knowledge via articles, presentations, social media submissions
